

The Gavel

You may have paid attention to the Moderator at Town Meeting... but maybe not to the Moderator's gavel!

The story of the West Newbury gavel begins not in Massachusetts, but in Port Hudson, Louisiana, in 1863. Soldiers of the Confederacy felled many trees to construct fortifications around Port Hudson for its defense, which endured a 48-day siege by Union forces.

The wood in particular that makes up the gavel was used to construct the citadel, the stronghold of the defenses. 30 years later, in 1894, the West Newbury Town Clerk wished to have a "token of authority" for he and the Town Moderator (and those in future) to use managing meetings. The Clerk arranged to have wood from the citadel procured by a freedman in Port Hudson and Lt. Col. Eben Stanwood of the Massachusetts 48th Regiment (one of the units that fought at Port Hudson). It was then fashioned into the gavel as a historical souvenir and icon of democracy. A full account of the acquisition and the battle are found in the Town Report of 1894.
